





Reflection

The Genealogy of Jesus

Mt 1:1-17

Historically, the line of succession for a monarch is extremely important: a king's father should be a king, whose father was also a king or at least noble. It is no different in Middle Eastern culture – we often discuss people's family and their line of descent as saying something about who they are. For royal persons, the proof of their royalty was shown by their genealogy, the record of their family through generations. This week we read the genealogy of Jesus from the Gospel (Matt. 1:1-17).

But what exactly does the reading mean? One would guess that the Lord of All, our Almighty God, would have the most prestigious genealogy when He willed to become man. However, Jesus Christ, the King of Kings, chose to make himself “nothing by taking the very nature of a servant” (Phil. 2:7). So that Christ might raise up our fallen nature, the Most High took the lowest and humblest place on Earth. He Who is robed in fire in the courts of heaven chose to be born in a cave and placed in a trough of animals wrapped in rags. And His genealogy attests to His own lowering of His Lordship to humility.

Rather than examining each and every person mentioned in the 42 generations, it serves to look at just one as an example: Rahab. Rahab is mentioned in the beginning of the Old Testament in the Book of Joshua when the Hebrews are trying to establish themselves as a nation. This descendent of Christ is explicitly mentioned to be a prostitute. Though He could have chosen to have only royal ancestors, God chose to enter into the entire lowliness of the human race that He might sanctify and purify it entirely. If one of us were to be told our ancestor was a prostitute we would likely be embarrassed – but our God has chosen to become a lowly man that He might allow us to participate in His divine nature (what Eastern Christianity calls divinization or *theosis*).

Our Syriac Fathers emphasize often that the King of Kings, Jesus Christ, was not born to a great house but to a poor, young virgin, Mary, and Joseph, a working man. This is demonstrative of God's love for mankind, in that the Rich One would become poor to enrich us. When Christ became man, He united to His divinity to our humanity and therefore we were given access to His divinity. Our prayers for the Sunday Before Christmas recount this:

O Richest One, You became poor for our sake that You should make us rich. You dawned from the Holy Virgin and appeared in the world while legions of angels sang praises with their clamor on this day of Your birth, saying, “Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace and good hope to mankind.” O Lord, enrich us by the gift of Your divine graces and, with the heavenly hosts, may we offer glory and thanks to You, and to Your Father, and to Your living and Holy Spirit, now and at all times, forever. Amen.

The Hidden One became manifest as man that we might not only see Him, but that we too might participate in the wealth of His holiness and immortality. Christ has come to save us, not because we did something to deserve His salvation but because of His gratuitous love.

By the descent of Christ, He has raised us up to be greater than the angels in that if we follow His will and receive what He has given us in His earthly dispensation we truly become the likeness of God as He made us (Gen. 1:27). Christ has suffered every abasement, condescension and abasement that He might lift us up from the shame of our sin to His own glory. Let us give thanks to Him in His humility and glorify Him for His love, which moved Him to elevate us by His birth.


