



Reflection

The banquet was laid at the Consecration and Dedication of the Church, the guests were called through the Announcements, and now we are almost at the moment we have been awaiting for a long time - the Birth of Our Lord, God and Savior, Jesus Christ. It is appropriate, then, that our period of long expectation should be concluded with Genealogy Sunday, named for the fact that the reading from the Gospel today lists Jesus's family descent from Adam, the first man, through his paternal side (that is, Joseph). And just as was seen last week with the reflection for the Revelation to Joseph, Christ's coming has been awaited for millennia!

Everything in the Old Testament bears witness to awaiting Christ. If we look at Genesis, the first book of the Bible, we find even Jacob, from the third generation of the forty-two listed in today's Gospel, expressing his hope for the coming of Christ. In Genesis 49:9-11, Jacob predicts a king from the children of Judah, who is also in the genealogy, that will be unmovable like a lion, universal in authority, and whose garments shall be soaked in what appears to be blood (similar to Is. 63:3). Jacob expresses his hope for the coming of Christ in his final earthly words - both His universal kingship and His salvific death.

Elsewhere in Scripture, a numberless amount of descriptions of the Lord to come is given by all the various prophets through the ages. Does this mean Jesus likes to keep His people waiting endlessly for the sake of suspense? Of course not. But since the Fall of Adam great damage was done to the relationship of God and man. The entire Old Testament details all the preparations for healing that damage - which is why the Old Testament is still very relevant to the Christian of today! It is not simply history past, but speaks to our relationship with Christ presently.

The idea of the application of Scripture both as a historical event and to our current relationship with God is known as typology. St. Ephrem and the Syriac Fathers used this very often. They sought out the images in the Old Testament, like those in Jacob's words, which give us insight into Christ. St. Ephrem said they are as endless and nourishing as a natural spring of water when we meditate upon them. One of the most common typology used by the Syriac Fathers is the Son of Man who appears in a furnace in Babylon when three saints of God are thrown into the same furnace by a pagan king, and the Son of Man (i.e. Jesus) protects them from harm (Dan. 3:25). The rich image speaks of Christ protecting us from spiritual and physical harm daily, as well as the fire of hell, from which He wishes to spare us.

A list of typologies that express the coming of our true Hope, Jesus, would fill volumes (as even St. Ephrem in his hundreds of works is unable to exhaust them all). But they can all be summarized by the St. Athanasius's words from his book *On the Incarnation*, "God became man so that man can become god," just as the priest says every mass, "You have assumed what is ours, and you have given us what is yours." God Who is incomprehensible and inexpressible lowered Himself in His mercy to human nature to not only restore what Adam lost, but offer participation in the divine nature, which we call *theosis*.

Since Adam mankind has awaited Jesus our God to united in relationship once again. But the coming of Christ did even more than we could have hoped - it united us in nature, elevating our humanity, granting us eternal life with Him when He comes again if we seek Him now. Let us give thanks to Him for His life-giving and saving Incarnation.


